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Course Description

This class will investigate how women authors from different backgrounds and time periods describe their experiences in print. We will explore whether women's writing has a particular aesthetic or voice that sets it apart from men's. For example, we will ask ourselves if women are attracted to some styles or themes more than others. By approaching texts by women of different races, sexual orientations, and social classes, we'll see how diversity creates a lively dialogue about what it means to be female. Texts will include Toni Morrison's *The Bluest Eye*, Rita May Brown's *Rubyfruit Jungle*, and Emily Brontë's *Wuthering Heights*, along with various short stories.
